


Diatonic Chord Progressions

A sequence of chords in a key is called a **diatonic chord progression**. The table below shows which chords sound best next to each other. A chord can be used more than once in a progression and a strong progression starts or ends on a stable chord

| <i>Stable</i>  <i>Unstable</i> | I | → | Anything |
| | vi | → | IV, V, I, ii |
| | IV | → | I, V, vi, iii |
| | V | → | I, IV, vi |
| | iii | → | vi, I, IV, ii |
| | ii | → | V, IV, iii |

Sample Progressions

Here are some sample progressions created using the table above. Examples are written using roman numerals and letters in the key of C.

Starts stable

Ends stable

vi V IV iii iii I vi IV
 Am G F Em Em C Am F

Remember lower case roman numerals are minor chords and capital roman numerals are major chords.
